



West Fork communities rally around new food pantry

The West Fork Food Pantry has found a permanent home in a former bowling alley in Sheffield, thanks to the generosity and support from area churches, organizations, businesses and community members.

The pantry started serving families of Franklin County and the West Fork School District at its new location in July 2021 and celebrated its grand opening in August with a mortgage burning. In addition, a \$90,000 capital campaign to fund the pantry started in June and to date has raised \$135,000. Pastor Kim Wills, who serves Zion St. John Lutheran in Sheffield, credits the work of the Holy Spirit.

“During a time when there is so much conflict and disagreement in the world, the community and volunteers came together, united in a common goal, and that appealed

to numerous donors,” Wills says.

FROM MOBILE TO PERMANENT

The pantry began serving families in 2016 as a mobile food pantry through the Food Bank of Iowa. Pre-packed boxes of food were delivered by truck each month to Zion St. John for distribution to families. In 2018, the Food Bank informed the West Fork Pantry Board of Directors that their pantry would need to become a permanent pantry to better serve the growing needs in the area.

“Some board members wondered out loud if we could pull off paying for two distributions of food a month and if we would have enough volunteers to sustain the mission,” Wills says. “I remember looking out the window and praying, ‘Lord, this is your ministry. If it is going to succeed, you will need to sustain it.’”

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The West Fork Food Pantry moved to a permanent location in downtown Sheffield this summer to meet growing demand to serve families of Franklin County and the West Fork School District.

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With \$200 in the bank and \$400 in bills due, the permanent West Fork Food Pantry opened in the fall of 2018 at Zion St. John, first in the Narthex and then in the basement.

“Food was stored in every available nook and cranny of the church,” Wills says.

A downtown office offered additional storage space for the food, and five freezers and two refrigerators were added in the church garage, a WELCA storage room, and a Sunday school room.

“Sorting monthly shipments was a real challenge, especially on bitterly cold winter days,” Wills recalls. “Volunteers hauled food downstairs for distribution and back upstairs to people’s cars. It continued that way for two and a half years.”

The Board began considering options for a larger permanent site

and learned that the owners of the saloon located in the former bowling alley were looking to sell. With \$25,000 saved for a down payment, the Board purchased the building in May 2021. The capital campaign kicked off in June to pay down the mortgage, and volunteers worked alongside local electricians and carpenters to begin remodeling the building.

According to Diane Wills, food pantry coordinator, one of the best features of the new location is the walk-in cooler, which fulfilled an immediate need during the pantry’s first week open in July.

“We received an urgent Facebook message from the Food Bank just before the July 4 weekend that a shipment of seven pallets of mushrooms had been refused at a distribution center in Cedar Falls because the truck was two degrees too warm,” Diane says. “If our pantry couldn’t take a significant number of them, the mushrooms were headed to the landfill.”

Four pallets of mushrooms were delivered to Sheffield and placed in the walk-in cooler. By working with other local pantries and the MEANS Database — an online platform that connects non-profit organizations with surplus food — homes were found for all of the mushrooms. Diane adds that another 700 pounds of food headed to landfills was rescued and distributed during August.

COMMUNITY SUPPORT

Grants and generous donations from congregations, organizations, businesses, families and individuals enabled the \$90,000 capital cam-

campaign to surpass its goal in less than three months. A “Pack the Pantry” event in December helped stock the pantry shelves for the winter months. Service groups, congregation members and others from across the community volunteer to help with food distribution and to keep the pantry running.

“The benefits of the food pantry extend beyond those needing food,” Wills says. “The pantry provides opportunities for church and community members to engage in hands-on service work. Numerous friendships have been formed between members

Help is coming, it's just not here yet.

CHRISTMAS CELEBRATING

When anticipation has reached a peak, there is always a little relief mingled with the joy of the Christmas celebration. This December we are celebrating with Linda Hamilton as she transitions to retirement at the end of 2021. Linda has served in the synod office for 30 years,

It will be hard to imagine the synod office without Linda, but we wish her well as she takes more time to be with grandchildren and her quilting. Linda Hamilton to begin new year as a retiree

After 30 years working in the synod office, Linda Hamilton has been a go-to person to answer just about any synod-related question a rostered minister, congregation member or fellow staff member may have. That changes the end of December when Linda retires as secretary for the Northeastern Iowa Synod.

Linda joined the synod staff as a part-time receptionist in 1991 and soon became the full-time secretary for the Bishop and synod ministries related to the roster, call process and committees connected to the Synod Council. She has been one of the first contacts for rostered ministers new to the synod, helping them with letters of call, transfers, and needed paperwork to send to the churchwide office.

"I have always especially enjoyed meeting the new candidates for ministry and helping to walk them through their process, keep track of things for them, and answer their questions," Linda says.

Linda recalls the first time Pastor Steven Ullestad, who was assistant to Bishop David Brown at the time, introduced her to a group of confir-



mation kids and said her "ministry" was to greet people and make them feel welcome.

"I had never thought about my role here as a ministry before he said that. Over the years, though, I have understood that better as a welcoming person and how to treat people. I always try to be as helpful as possible."

Linda says some of the biggest changes in her work have been going from paper to digital for the call process and rostered and ministry site profiles. This year, the Northeastern Iowa Synod Assembly

even went digital as an online event, and Linda stepped up to serve as assembly manager.

As a long-time member of Faith Lutheran, Shell Rock, Linda has been involved in mutual ministry for more than 20 years, has served on the church council and call committees, has taught Sunday school and confirmation, and has often served as an assistant minister and lay reader. Linda has also joined others from the synod and her own family members on mission trips to Guatemala and Jamaica.

During retirement, Linda plans to stay closer to home to pursue sewing and quilting and to spend more time with her husband, Will, three daughters and grandchildren.

"I have always been really grateful for this job with the synod," Linda says. "It's been a great place to work. It helped support my family and I have been really thankful for that. I appreciate all the people I have worked with and gotten to know."

The five founding churches represented on the West Fork Pantry Board of Directors are Zion St. John, Sheffield; St. Peter Lutheran, Rockwell; St. Paul Lutheran, Thornton; First United Methodist,

Sheffield; and West Fork United Methodist, rural Sheffield.

Prior to the pandemic, the food pantry served about 40 to 50 families, or approximately 140 to 150 people each month. Now, the pantry averages 100 families per month, or

nearly 300 individuals. Pantry hours expanded in November to every Thursday from 2 to 5 p.m. and the first Saturday of the month from 10 a.m. to 12 noon.

Did you know that January 11 is Human Trafficking Awareness Day? Or that January is Human Trafficking Awareness Month? The Women of the ELCA has a history of fighting Human Trafficking. There are resources available at the womenoftheelca.org website. A quick google search of Human Trafficking Prayers gives you over 1,410,000 results. There are different kinds of trafficking, however the one I think of most often, that sees an increase in occurrence with sporting events is sexual trafficking, be it women or children. Often in January there is a list of daily prayers to end human trafficking that ends on the day of the Superbowl. Some of us, may think that it only happens in big cities, or urban areas, but I know it happens in rural areas as well. Traffickers use the interstate to bring victims from one area to another. One thing I have done is put the Human Trafficking Hotline number 888-373-7888 in my phone, in both my personal and my work cell phones. If you see something that makes you wonder, just call and report it. They will investigate. I don't know if you have noticed, but I have, when I stop and use gas station bathrooms, there are posters or cards with phone number or texting options to get help if you are in need. Often times traffickers make sure their victims do not have phones to use so acronyms or something easy to remember is there for when the victim might get access to a phone. What can you do today to help bring an end human trafficking?
