

Celebrating Renewal: Johannes Bugenhagen, Parish Pastor of the Reformation

Encourage youth to explore their ministry gifts

“Have you ever thought about a call to ministry? I think you have some gifts suited for ministry.”

Lily Brondyke was attending her sister’s high school theater event when a family friend, who happened to be a pastor, turned to Brondyke and shared those simple, life-changing words.

“I would have never considered ministry without that external voice naming it so pointedly to me,” says Brondyke, who is a second year Master of Divinity residential student at Wartburg Theological Seminary in Dubuque. “I didn’t have the language or the inclination to recognize a vocational calling to ministry until someone equipped me.”

The Rev. Dr. Brian Beckstrom, dean of Spiritual Life/Moehlmann Chaplain Chair for Wartburg College, sees firsthand how a few words of encouragement can spark a young person’s interest in ministry. Beckstrom coordinates the Integrated B.A./M.Div. Degree Program for Ordained Ministry, which allows students to complete a Bachelor of Arts from Wartburg College and a Master of Divinity from Wartburg Seminary in six years, rather

than eight. The program, which is in its third year, offers a streamlined curriculum that reduces redundancies and enables some classes to count for both seminary and college credit.

Almost all the students in the program have been referred to it by someone from their congregation. “The number one thing we have discovered is that it is helpful for students to have someone they know and trust give them a nudge to think about ministry,” Beckstrom says. “Students need to know that someone sees those gifts in them.”

Beckstrom suggests pastors and adult leaders pay attention to which students take on leadership roles in their youth groups, help with worship services, and are willing to think about what God is calling them to do. Encourage those students to explore their faith formation more in depth through Bible camp, ELCA Youth Gatherings, and the synod’s Lutheran Youth Organization Network and annual Wholly Iowa Youth Leadership Discipling Event (WIYLDE).

YOUTH ACTIVITIES CAN NURTURE THE CALL TO MINISTRY

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who plans to go on to seminary. “These places were full of validation, hope and safety in some of the darkest times in my life. The opportunity to get to know other Christians, hear testimony, worship, share Bible studies, and learn more about Jesus changed my life and made me fired up for ministry.”

how to share the good news of Jesus Christ with both young and old.

“I knew when I was in high school, after I was a leader-in-training at Ewalu, that I would work in ministry,” Hoey says. “At Wartburg College my religion professors prepared me for seminary, and now that I am in seminary, I continue to walk on this journey of ministry with God guiding me and calling me.”

Hoey says that the most supportive individuals of his journey toward ministry have been his parents, his grandparents and his wife, Miranda, who often tells him he is going to be a wonderful pastor. “When she says this, I know she means it with her whole heart,” Hoey says. “I can’t help but feel encouraged and keep walking along this journey.”

From his own experience, Hoey says that one of the best ways to get young people excited about participating in ministry is to empower them in the little things. “Ask them to do special music for worship or to be a worship assistant and nudge them toward a Bible camp. Eventually you may want to point them toward seminary, but before you do that, you need to empower them as lay leaders in their communities.”

Kiefer emphasizes how important it is to allow youth to have a say in what happens in their congregation and to offer consistent times for youth groups, mission trips and other events. “Adults should do their best to make these places feel

safe, where youth can be themselves and have time set aside to talk about Jesus and make connections with others.” Kiefer says. “As a youth, it feels good to be validated, loved and heard.”

LEARN ABOUT MINISTRY VOCATIONS THROUGH CAMPUS VISITS

Beckstrom encourages students to take advantage of special discernment days offered by Luther College, Wartburg Seminary and Wartburg College. Pastors and congregational leaders are invited to bring their students to Wartburg College for a “Vocation Day” planned for April. Offered in partnership with the Northeastern Iowa Synod, this day of discernment gives middle school and high school youth an opportunity to learn about parish pastor ministry and other leadership opportunities in the ELCA. Look for more details in next month’s *Star* newsletter and on the synod’s website, www.neiasynod.org, when the date is confirmed.

The junior year is when high school students think the most about their vocation goals and start campus visits, but Beckstrom says he is happy to receive referrals for students as young as ninth grade.

“We try to build a pool of students to talk to about ministry as a discernment process rather than recruitment,” Beckstrom says. “Ministry is not right for everyone, so we want to make sure they have a really developed sense of what God is doing in their lives.”

Most students enter the B.A./M.

In college, Kiefer says her desire to pursue ministry continues to be reinforced by her friends, campus pastors, church family and those she has met working on staff at Camp EWALU. “I never went to a Bible camp growing up; however, I believe that camp is truly a place where youth can encounter and develop a burning love for Christ and ministry.”

Tyler Hoey says his whole life has been a journey leading him to where he is today — a third-year Wartburg Seminary student serving his internship in Loganville, Wis. Growing up, Hoey attended Camp Ewalu every summer and began serving as a counselor while in high school. He says he was able to practice his ministry skills and learn



Remembering Herbert Chilstrom, first ELCA presiding bishop

The Rev. Dr. Herbert W. Chilstrom, who served as the first presiding bishop of the ELCA, died Jan. 19 at his home in Green Valley, Ariz. Chilstrom served as ELCA presiding bishop from May 1987 to October 1995.

Originally from Litchfield, Minn., Chilstrom served three parishes in

Minnesota, was a professor of religion and an academic dean at Luther College, Teaneck, N.J., and was bishop of the Minnesota Synod of the Lutheran Church in America before becoming the ELCA presiding bishop.

Chilstrom last visited the Northeastern Iowa Synod in 2013 as a special guest along with three other early church leaders to celebrate the 25th anniversary of the ELCA. Chilstrom presented a workshop at the assembly about the early years of the church. He recalled attending the first commission meeting in 1982 with 70 people there. "Thankfully, some wise people emerged in that process," Chilstrom said.

Chilstrom also gave the Sunday morning sermon at the 2013 assembly, in which he spoke about tithing and living a generous life. He shared how as a youth he hated confirmation and singing in junior choir, but a week at Bible camp one summer became a major turning point in his life. "The Good News that God

loved me exactly as I was came to life in me," he said.

He began to read his Bible every day, joined the adult choir and became the unpaid youth director for the congregation. He later came across a pamphlet about the pleasure believers get from tithing, so he started to tithe while in high school and continued it into college and with his wife throughout their marriage. Chilstrom called tithing as a first gift a joyful way of life, and he invited others to join him.

Chilstrom is survived by his wife of 65 years, Corinne (Hansen), also a Lutheran pastor; and a daughter, son and four sisters. Two services will take place: Thursday, Feb. 13, at Desert Hills Lutheran Church in Green Valley, Ariz., and Saturday, Feb. 15, at Gustavus Adolphus College in St. Peter, Minn.

The Internal Revenue Service 2020 optional standard mileage rate for calculating the deductible costs of operating a car, van, pickup or panel truck for business is 57.5 cents per mile, down one half of a cent from the rate for 2019. For medical or moving purposes, the 2020 rate is 17 cents per mile. The rate for driving in service of charitable organizations is 14 cents per mile.


Poor February!


A fun and easy heart craft – showing children that Jesus' love for us truly is unconditional. Tape it on a mirror in their bedroom or bathroom so they see it every day.

History of Valentine's Day

No one is quite sure where the origins of Valentine's Day first came from. There were at least three Saint Valentine's from the early Catholic Church who were martyrs. The day of St. Valentine could have been named after any one of them. The day became associated with romance sometime in the Middle Ages. In the 1300s English poet Geoffrey Chaucer wrote a poem that linked the day with love. This likely was the beginning of celebrating love on this day. In the 18th century sending romantic cards on Valentine's Day became very popular. People made elaborate handmade cards with ribbons and lace. They also began to use hearts and cupids as decorations. The holiday spread to the United States and in 1847 the first mass produced Valentine's cards were made by entrepreneur Esther Howland.

Here's a Valentines' Day craft to help kids remember that Jesus loved them so much, He gave up His life on a cross. Use brown foam sheets or construction paper for the cross and candy hearts. Pick (appropriate) sayings from the candy hearts to glue on the cross. You can then use magnetic tape to put on the back for a magnet, (wait until glue from putting the candy on dries) or you can string a ribbon thru the top for hanging.





Each year, Ash Wednesday marks the beginning of Lent and is always 46 days before Easter Sunday. Lent is a 40-day season (not counting Sundays) marked by repentance, fasting, reflection, and ultimately celebration. The 40-day period represents Christ's time of temptation in the wilderness, where he fasted and where Satan tempted him. Lent asks believers to set aside a time each year for similar fasting, marking an intentional season of focus on Christ's life, ministry, sacrifice, and resurrection. Often called the Day of Ashes, Ash Wednesday starts Lent by focusing the Christian's heart on repentance and prayer, usually through personal and communal confession. This happens during a special Ash Wednesday service.

Here are some activities that will help children learn more about Ash Wednesday & Lent:

- Have a big pancake feast on Shrove Tuesday (the day right before Ash Wednesday), sharing the meaning behind it. Pancake Day comes from England where it was common tradition to use up all the eggs, milk, and butter in the kitchen prior to Ash Wednesday. These ingredients were often used to make pancakes!
- On Ash Wednesday, hold a simple candle-lighting service at home. Have each person reflect on things they'd like to let go of – bad habits and so on. Burn those as a way of releasing them. Prayer: Lord have mercy on us, forgive us, and help us to do better.
- Draw a large cross or use a cross you may have hanging on the wall. Take your finger and trace around the shape of the cross while saying the Lord's Prayer. Make this a daily practice throughout Lent this year.
- Attend an Ash Wednesday service! Explain beforehand why we start Lent this way – if you need help check out this website: https://www.ducksters.com/holidays/ash_wednesday.php

An easy and meaningful activity to participate in throughout Lent is to create a 40-day prayer chain.

Simply take construction paper and cut the paper into 40 strips (or 46 if you want to include Sundays,) about 1 inch by 8 inches, but that can vary a bit. (Just be sure your paper chain strips are wide enough to write on, and not too narrow that you can't read them, or too wide that they become giant, droopy paper ovals.)

Each day talk about someone or something you and your children would like to pray for and write it on one of the strips of paper. (One prayer request per paper strip.) You can guide the children to include both prayers of thanksgiving, and prayers requesting something. Then tape, glue, or staple the chains together. On Day 2 you will have 2 links on your chain; Day 3 there will be 3, and so on.) Every day until Easter they will see their prayer chain growing and growing! What a fun way to learn about praying for one another!
