New 'C3' Ministry Fair to offer more than 20 workshops

All congregation members from the Northeastern Iowa Synod are invited to attend the synod's first "Creative Collaborative Congregations (C3)" Ministry Fair Saturday, June 1, at Wartburg College, Waverly.

This new event is an opportunity for lay people, pastors and deacons from across the synod to gather in fellowship, learn together, share ideas and get inspired with skills to strengthen their congregational ministries. This year's Ministry Fair replaces the Synod Assembly, which will take place every other year and will meet again June 7, 2025.

SOMETHING FOR EVERYONE

The Ministry Fair will feature more than 20 workshops, along with round table discussions and displays to support congregations, staff members, council members, Sunday school teachers, youth leaders, and volunteers in their ministries and administrative activities. Parents and family members will find a number of workshops on faith in the home, keeping children safe, spiritual practices, and other family-focused topics.

Everyone will be able to attend two workshops in the morning beginning at 9 a.m. and two in the afternoon, concluding at 3:45 p.m. Check-in for the fair will begin at 8:30 a.m. The day will also include a devotional worship service, lunch



with round-table conversations and a service project to support area food pantries. (See page 2.) Everyone who plays an instrument is invited to join the worship band, which will perform at the worship service. (See page 6.)

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"I am very grateful for the network leaders, pastors and others who are stepping up to share their best practices and ideas on a variety of topics," Jones says. "These are talented people who have a lot of passion about ministry and want to share it with others."

WORKSHOPS TO SUPPORT MINISTRY

Here is a look at some of the planned workshops and presenters:

Everything You Ever Wanted to Know About Calling a Pastor or Deacon

Pastor Steve Brackett, assistant to the Bishop, will explore what is leading to a longer call process time for congregations and will suggest strategies and resources to help bridge the gap between calls and shorten the length of a call process.

Make Time for Strategic Ministry

Brittney Swanson, executive director of Lutheran Lakeside Camp at Spirit Lake, will share ideas to help congregations think strategically about their ministries, explore ways to build relationships with youth and adults in worship and outside of worship, and suggest ways to make worship an interactive place for people of all ages.

Faith Formation & Volunteer Recruitment: Thinking Outside the Box

Deacon Jackie Schilling of St. John, Nashua, and Lisa Acton will share innovative approaches to faith formation and volunteer recruitment. They will look at current practices and introduce ways for congregations to stretch their imaginations and consider fresh alternatives. This session will inspire pastors, educators and lay leaders to think

BRING BIRTHDAY CAKE KITS TO THE FAIR!

SERVICE PROJECTS TO SUPPORT FOOD PANTRIES

The Hunger Network invites congregations to bring birthday cake kits and packages of sanitary products to be distributed to food pantry ministries in this synod.

The birthday cake kits contain items needed to celebrate a birthday or special day, including a cake mix, candles, canned frosting, a can of soda (to replace oil and eggs), and a birthday card



in a foil cake pan. Additional items can also be added, such as paper plates, sprinkles and other cake decorations, streamers, and party hats.

People are also encouraged to bring a variety of sanitary products (tampons, pads, panty liners, etc.) in their original packages. The kits and supplies can be brought to the Neumann Auditorium lobby during the Ministry Fair.



creatively and take practical steps toward revitalizing their faith community.

The Dwelling: The Church That Started as Three Showers and a Trailer

Paula Letsche and Audra Cherry of Redeemer Lutheran, Waverly, will share about Redeemer's intergenerational mission trip to Winston-Salem, N.C., and The Dwelling, a congregation made up of people who are currently or formerly housing insecure and led by Pastor Emily (Harkins) Norris, a graduate of Wartburg College and Wartburg Theological Seminary. Congregations will learn how they can become part of this spirit and service learning experience, which

includes relationship building, learning about justice issues, storytelling and service.

Reflecting on Your Congregation's Legacy

Pastor Dione Stepanek, Director for Evangelical Mission for the La Crosse Area Synod, will present options for congregations to consider if they ever need to make decisions about the ongoing viability of their ministry—such as closure down the road, a new partnership or other radical change. Thinking ahead can help congregations plan for an enduring Christ-focused legacy for the sake of future ministry.

Congregations are invited to connect in ministry

In the days following Jesus' crucifixion, the disciples, and many others who had put their hope in Jesus, could only focus on what was lost. Their leader, the one who had taught them and expressed confidence in them to continue his proclamation and healing ministry, had been shamefully executed on the cross. In their grief over his loss, Jesus' followers could only feel fear, shame, and guilt. So, they hid in the upper room where they had shared that last supper together.

"We need to have our eyes opened to the ways Christ is alive and among us. Creative Collaborative Congregations is one way that we are going to try to do that."



When the resurrected Jesus appeared to them, one of the things he did was to remind them of God's continued presence and abundance in their midst. He met them in their grief, walking with them and breaking bread with them. He met them in their doubts, letting them touch him and feed him. He met them in their resignation, calling them from their nets once more and sending them out.

When we are losing things and it feels like the world is falling apart, it's important to remember that God is still present, abundantly blessing us, and calling us to a ministry of proclamation and healing.

MEET YOUR NEIGHBORS & SHARE IDEAS

Creative Collaborative Congregations (C3) is designed to be a reminder of God's abundance in our midst. It's an opportunity to meet the resurrected Christ in the ministries of our neighboring congregations. It's an opportunity for leaders in Northeastern Iowa to share their passion, their knowledge, and what they are challenged by as they are sent by the living Christ into the world around us. It's a chance to network and make connections with others who are also hearing Christ call to them.

Who should come to the C3? The person who wants to do ministry but feels unequipped. The person who wants their congregation to get involved in environmental ministry, day care ministry, lay ministry or some other ministry but can't find anyone else to join them. The person who wants to know how to get involved, where to start, or who to talk to for encouragement and support. The person who is just looking for the spark of an idea to ignite a bit more life in them and their community.

It is my prayer, and the work of my office, that we move beyond the competition between congregations for members, program participants and dollars. Instead, we need to recognize the gifts each congregation (and member) brings to the Synod and the whole Church. We need to have our eyes opened to the ways Christ is alive and among us. Creative Collaborative Congregations is one way that we are going to try to do that.

Are we ready to leave our "upper rooms" where Jesus comes to us and go out to meet the resurrected Jesus in the wider world? I believe we are. I believe we have to.


Learn about Land Acknowledgements

land acknowledgement for its campus and how congregations can move toward creating their own land acknowledgements to honor and recognize the Indigenous Peoples who were original stewards of their land. Bishop Kevin Jones will be among the presenters.

Free Youth Ministry Webinars

The Northeastern Iowa Synod has entered into a partnership with Youth Ministry Consultants to offer free monthly webinars for those who work with youth in faith formation. All youth workers, clergy members, volunteers, parents and anyone from this synod who impacts kids and teens can access the live webinars by using the code **NEIA24** on the Youth Ministry Consultants website.

Youth Ministry Consultants is a nonprofit organization that offers coaching, consulting and training to help parents, leaders and churches be more effective and intentional in sharing Jesus to the next generation. According to Rebecca Jacobson, YMC director of training and strategy, the live webinars give people an opportunity to ask questions and interact with experts who they would not otherwise have access to. Many of the topics center on realities facing small churches, such as budget issues and lack of volunteers.

"The webinars share practical information that people can use to grow their ministry," Jacobson says.

Recent presentations have focused on small church ministry, caring for challenging kids, nurturing lasting faith, creating safe spaces for youth, and management strategies. Two webinars are planned for April—"Faith Beyond the Youth Group" on April 4 and "Partnering with Parents" on April 25.

A list of upcoming webinars and previous presentations is available on the Youth Ministry Consultants website.

"We hear from leaders with youth ministry programs that are hanging by a thread, and they tell us they feel encouraged," Jacobson says. "This information gives them the boost they need to try something new."

ELCA Youth Gathering Updates

Some 436 participants from more than 30 Northeastern lowa Synod congregations are now registered to attend the Youth Gathering July 16-20 in New Orleans. As the date gets closer, new policies and recommendations continue to be an-



nounced. Here is a look at some of the latest updates.

2024 GATHERING VENUE POLICIES

The following policies will be in effect at the Smoothie King Center and Convention Center.

- Cashless Venue—The Smoothie King Cener and Convention Center are cashless. Please be prepared to use a credit or debit card when purchasing food at concessions at either of these venues.
- **2. Clear Bottles**—Water bottles should be clear and/or translucent. No metal/aluminum or glass water bottles will be permitted.
- 3. Clear Bags—Participants will be able to carry the following style and size bag, package or container at the convention center, stadium plaza areas, stadium gates, or when approaching queue lines awaiting entry into the stadium:
 - Bags that are clear plastic, vinyl, or PVC and do not exceed 12" x 6" x 12".
 - No buckles, grommets/hardware, or décor can be concealing any part of the bag.
 - One-gallon clear plastic freezer bag. Logo can only be on one side of the bag.
 - Small, non-clear bags that do not exceed 4.5" x 6.5" in size, with or without a handle or strap, can be taken into venues with one of the clear plastic bags.

COLLECT COOLING TOWELS FOR IN-KIND OFFERING

In the aftermath of a storm, hurricane or tornado, New Orleans residents regularly find themselves without electricity. This quickly becomes a health crisis as people try to manage life in the hot, humid Gulf Coast summers.

GETTING READY EVENT

MAY 5, 2024

All youth and youth leaders from this synod who are registered for the ELCA Youth Gathering should plan to attend the Getting Ready event set for Sunday, May 5, at Wartburg College.

Check-in will begin at 1:30 p.m. at the McCaskey Lyceum, located in the Saemann Student Center. Programming is from 2 – 5 p.m. and will include games, discussion led by Chaplain Maggie Falenschek on how to process unfamiliar topics or situations, and Bible time with Bishop Kevin Jones using Unit 5 of the Getting Ready materials.

Everyone planning to attend the Gathering is highly encouraged to attend this informational meeting. There is no charge to attend. Leaders can RSVP for their groups at www.neiasynod.org/gathering-24.

City leaders and community organizers identified the eight most-requested items to help residents as they wait for the power grid to be restored. A goal for the Gathering is to create 3,000 disaster relief kits filled with these items to help New Orleanians get through the days immediately following a natural disaster.

It takes about \$100 to complete an entire disaster relief kit. Synods are encouraged to collect items assigned to their regions to contribute to the disaster relief kits. As part of Region 5, the Northeastern lowa Synod youth groups are asked to collect cooling towels for the kits or raise funds to complete an entire kit.

Starting in April, people will be able to order cooling towels directly through an Amazon Wishlist with items being delivered directly to New Orleans. Now we need your help to make sure families and neighborhoods are prepared for the next disaster.

Good Shepherd, Decorah wins national energy saver award

Congratulations to Good Shepherd Lutheran Church of Decorah for winning the energy saver category of Interfaith Power & Light's 2024 Cool Congregations Challenge!

IPL awarded congregation winners in six categories and 16 runner-ups for their work in responding to climate change by reducing their carbon footprint. Good Shepherd received the \$1,000 Energy Saver Award for eliminating the use of fossil fuels in heating, cooling, lighting, and powering their buildings. They have converted their building to all-electric with heat pumps to heat and cool their buildings, powered entirely by solar on their property, preventing 25 tons of carbon emissions annually.

The Cool Congregations Challenge, is an annual national contest to recognize "Cool Congregations" that are becoming energy efficient and sustainable role models within their

communities. The contest is available through Interfaith Power & Light, a nonprofit organization inspiring and mobilizing people of faith and conscience to take bold and just action on climate.

The Rev. Dr. William ("Bill") Paul Thalacker died Jan. 31, 2024, at the age of 89. He was ordained May 28, 1961. He graduated from Wartburg College, Waverly, and Wartburg Theological Seminary, Dubuque. He also earned a master's degree in religion from the University of Iowa and a Doctor of Ministry from Luther Theological Seminary in St. Paul.

He served as pastor for Bethany, West Branch; Ridgeway Parish (Peace, Madison, Orleans); Trinity, Hawkeye; Trinity, Waterloo; and St. John's Bennington, Dunkerton. He retired March 1, 2000. The funeral service will be April 20 at St. Paul's Lutheran Church in Waverly.

The Rev. Harold McMillin, Jr, died March 2, 2024, at the age of 78. He was ordained on June 10, 1973. He graduated from Wartburg College and Wartburg Theological Seminary. He served as pastor at St. John's Crane Creek, Tripoli; First, Dows and Vernon, Williams; Emmanuel, Fontanelle; Elgin, Elgin and Highland, Elkader; and St. John's, Guttenberg. After his first retirement in 2011, he served St. John, Luana and St. John, Farmersburg. He retired again in 2019 and was most recently serving as contract interim pastor for St. Peter, Garnavillo and Peace, Clayton.

This was my first time at such an event, where Lutherans from across the country came together to learn about effective programs addressing hunger, attend workshops, participate in discussion groups, engage in networking, and spend time collaborating with colleagues from their ELCA region. At first, I really didn't know what to expect, but what I found was a group of amazing people driven by their vision for making food accessible for all. They had a strong sense of camaraderie and were open and friendly, making it very easy for me as a newcomer to participate.

While there isn't space to share all the insights I gained from this World Hunger gathering, I would like to highlight experiences that had a real impact on my thinking. One was a workshop on grant writing for hunger, and the second was a session on advocacy for hunger.

In the workshop on developing grants, an experienced grant writer provided us with a survey of needs in world hunger (global and local) as well as a list of potential funding sources. She also provided insights on what makes a grant proposal effective, then shared examples of previously submitted proposals that were funded. From small local grants to larger international funding proposals, we all walked away from this experience thinking how we could move forward in developing proposals for our own area and state.

ADVOCATE BY THINKING SMALL

My second insight came from a presentation on the concept of advocacy, which has always been a struggle for me in understanding where to start. The idea of becoming an advocate for world hunger often seemed overwhelming. What I learned changed my thinking about the nature of advocacy within my own life.

They explained that as the community of Christ, ELCA is informed by the World Hunger program around economic issues and economic justice. What is it that causes hunger? The session raised the issues of high housing prices, healthcare costs, and quality food costs. If people don't have wages that pay enough, they are unable to afford their own safe place to live, health care to stay well, or decent food to nourish their bodies. Advocating for world hunger issues is the church's call to seek justice that has many facets and complexities. In this advocacy roll, we aren't asking anything for ourselves—we are asking for our neighbors.

In terms of advocacy, when people say they don't know where to start, it means they haven't really found their one thing yet. That thing is that piece of the puzzle which speaks to them. It was suggested in this advocacy ses-





sion that to think about advocacy is to think about what seems important and compelling—it can be worldwide, nationwide, statewide or local. What is it that needs changing or improving? They pointed out that when the focus is on a particular issue that can make a difference—the smaller it gets, the fewer people are required to make a difference.

This really helped me to answer some of my own questions about advocacy: Where do I begin? How do I start? What is enough to help? What I learned was that the smaller you start, the more influence you can have faster—one's enthusiasm can come from a genuine place.

I now see advocacy as a process of thoughtful selection, taking an issue one step at a time. To start one's own advocacy focus begins with brainstorming those pieces about hunger that one finds important. Focus on just one of those pieces and break it down into key elements or parts. Then, take one of those parts as the focus for advocacy. This helped me to see how we can pursue our passions to support and help with hunger issues in a realistic, yet meaningful way. By finding that niche of interest, it enables us to step in, support and make a difference in the needs of the people around us. It helps us to see the world through our lens of faith and to continue through our advocacy to live the life that Jesus reminds us to be.

Rejoice and Renew Recap

Rejoice & Renew was the theme for the Women's retreat that took place on Feb 23-24 at the Stone Center EWALU just north of Strawberry Point. It was a great opportunity to connect with other people in Northeast Iowa. Lots of eating, laughing, playing games, coloring, talking, learning and sharing. There were short devotions and Bible study about spreading the word. Did you know that the average Lutheran shares their faith every 67 years?

We also learned about Global Health Ministries and rolled bandages for them. GHM was started in the 60's by Lutheran health workers. They realized the overseas rural hospitals needed help with supplies. They started GHM in their garage, expanded to a storage unit and now have a warehouse in the Twin Cities. They help the medical facilities (most are Lutheran hospitals and clinics) who request items. Items can be anything from x ray machines, ultrasound, to scissors and medicine. Last year they sent cargo containers full of medical supplies to countries in Africa, India and Central America. Many of these clinics serve 10,000 people. Most are large areas with small villages. It is the little things that make the most difference. The rolled bandages that we make out of old sheets are used to tie IVs in place or to hold dressings on wounds. They also have things you can make for newborns, baby hats, quilts. They also have a suitcase ministry. You can donate old suitcases and they use them when they go to different countries to take medical supplies to the clinics they visit. They are packed and then left, so they always need more suitcases. We had 22 women gathered and they rolled enough bandages to fill a suitcase. Many sheets were ripped into strips and 7 bandage rollers were cranking.

Like to help and learn more? Our next gathering is June 15th at Redeemer Lutheran in Waverly.
